



Unit Title: Author Study - Nicola Davies - "Exploring the Animal World"

Grade Level: 1st Grade

Subject Area: Language Arts/Science

Duration/Length/Number of class periods: 5 Class Periods

Description:

Nicola Davies is a life-long observer of animals. She has studied and written about animals all over the world, but is just as interested in the animals that live in her own backyard in Wales, U.K. Davies often combines elements of both fiction and non-fiction - weaving together the experiences of an individual animal, such as a mother sea turtle, with more general facts and information about that animal.

- Explain major differences between books that tell stories and books that give information, drawing on a wide reading of a range of text types.

What Enduring Understandings are desired?

- Authors write with a purpose by using key details in informational texts and literature.
- Literature and informational texts have a central message (theme), main topic, and key details.

- Comparing and contrasting texts allows us to gain a deeper understanding of authors' messages, ideas and themes.

What Essential Ouestions will be considered?

- ♦ How does Nicola Davies keep her readers interested in the books she writes?
- How does Nicola Davies organize her books?
- Why does Nicola Davies write these types of books?

- What did you notice about the books by Nicola Davies that were the same? Different?
- What do Nicola Davies books always include? Often include? Sometimes include?
- Which of the Nicola Davies books did you think was the most interesting? Why?

Students will know / be able to:

- I can ask and answer questions about key details in a text. This means that after reading I can ask and answer questions about the most important parts of the text.
- ❖ I can state the main topic and key details. This means that after I read a non-fiction text I can tell what the text is mainly about.
- ❖ I can analyze and compare two, or more, books written by Nicola Davies.
- ❖ I can list characteristics specific to how Nicola Davies writes her books.

| ➤ Discuss the Text: ■ Revisit the information about the turtles before the main text of the story, the captions, and the index at the end. Talk about the extra information that these sections provide, and how they show Nicola Davies' writing style and ways of putting together a book. ■ What is one fact that Nicola Davies taught you about loggerhead turtles from this book? Have students turn and talk to a partner then ask for volunteers to share out to the whole group. ■ Add additional "noticings" to the chart paper list from day 2. | | | | |
| Day 4 ♣ Have children find out about another species of turtle or tortoise by using books from the school or classroom library, and the internet. Have them draw a picture of their favorite turtle or tortoise and write its name and 3 facts. ♣ Have students share their findings in a Flipgrid. ♣ Encourage them to view and respond to peers' FlipGrids. | | X | X | X |
| Day 5 Read an additional Nicola Davies text. Add any student noticings to the chart paper list from day 2 and 3. Guide students to findings that Nicola Davies often and always has a certain purpose and craft to her writing. Have students complete a Flipgrid describing Nicola Davies' writing style/craft (ie. things she often/always/sometimes) includes in her texts. If time, have them complete a Flipgrid sharing their favorite Nicola Davies story. | X | | X | X |
