



Unit Title: Getting Kids to 'Listen'

Grade Level: 12+ Adults

Subject Area: Early Childhood Family Education - Parent Ed

Duration/Length/Number of class periods: 2 (40-minute) class periods, 1 weekly

Description:

These lessons will explore a common need expressed by parents. "My child won't listen," most often reflects situations in which a child doesn't follow directions. The situation involves parenting style, parent expectations, and effective communication.

Summative assessments are not appropriate for my classroom setting. I do formative assessment on a continual basis as parents share their parenting experiences.

My role as Parent Educator in the classroom is largely one of facilitator. Questioning and parent responses become an integral part of the presentation.
