

Unit Title: INTRODUCTION TO ASL - LEVEL 1 (UNIT 1)

Grade Level: 9-12

Subject Area: AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE

Duration/Length/Number of class periods: 3 WEEKS (15 Classes)

Description: This introductory course is designed to provide students with the basic technical skills needed to use simple and basic ASL when communicating with Deaf people. This course will incorporate vocabulary, grammar, a basic understanding of Deaf culture and the Deaf community. Historical figures of the Deaf community will be introduced to the class.

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
